A message from...Synod Women's Organization President Melzee Jacobson

Greetings, We are off and running for a very fully packed year. To begin, I want to tell you all how amazing youare and what amazing work you do on behalf of the Synodical Women's Organization of the Northern Great Lakes Synod. We make an awesome team. This year's retreat will be hosted by ladies from Pound and Porterfield. We were notified in December that they had made the decision to take on this task. It is with pleasure that I can tell you that Pr. Christine Forsythe will be the Chaplain for this retreat. Those that attended in 2017 will remember her as the Chaplain at that time also. Barb Rice and myself of the Executive Board were available to meet with this group of ladies on January 30, 2018 to help them get started on their planning. The excitement and ideas around the table that day were exhilarating. They have some wonderful ideas and met again the other day to further cement some of them in place. The board is excited about the fact that Cluster 5, Menominee, is becoming active again. I received a call from Pr. James Wendt of Our Saviour's in Marinette asking if we could send someone to talk to the ladies about SWO at their Fireside Chat. We have been scheduled for Sunday March 25 to attend that event. At this time, myself, Barb Rice SWO Secretary and Gail Schmidt Board Member and Liaison for Cluster 5 have plans to attend. Other ladies from the churches in the Menominee Cluster are also welcome to attend. There will be a potluck supper also. I have received information from Churchwide about our CWO Representative assigned to attend our Convention and Retreat. Lisa Plorin, our current CWO President, will be traveling to be with us. Lisa is a very enthusiastic leader and a super neat lady. This is your chance to meet her and visit with her. So if you are thinking about attending the convention as a voting member or as a guest and/or the retreat this fall make sure that when you get the May Mailing with all the forms that you quickly register. We have room for 69 attendees to the retreat. We have room for 30 more if you do not mind sleeping on the top bunks in the duplexes but the first 69 to register will have options for Emmanuel, Grace and the duplexes (bottom bunks). In regard to housing: • Please remember that Grace fills up quickly. This is the lodge that has two single beds in each room and there are only 7 rooms available (the Chaplain is housed in room 8 to provide for privacy if anyone wishes to speak with her privately). Bedding is provided for Grace Lodge. • Emmanuel Lodge has six rooms. Room 2 is handicapped and has a queen bed and two single beds. This room is reserved until the registration deadline for any handicap requirements. Each of the other five rooms have two queen beds and are used to sleep 2 people. There is a futon that will fold out to sleep one also in each of these five rooms so it is possible for five to share a room if necessary. So these rooms will either accommodate four to five people. When registering as a group, please identify the others you will be sharing a room with. Bedding is also provided for Emmanuel Lodge. You may not be able to move in until registration time as sometimes there is another group using this lodge on Friday during the day. • Maple, Oak and Spruce are the duplexes. There are five sets of bunkbeds in each side of the duplexes. The bottom bunks are assigned first. If you register as a group, please identify the others that will be joining you. If necessary we can use the top bunks, but only if someone is agreeable to using them. You must provide your own bedding for the duplex. We received a Thrivent Action Team Grant to instruct others on basic sewing and machine sewing techniques. We had a great turn out for the first class and were able to provide super prizes and nonperishable food for the local food pantry. The event was held on a Saturday and we were able to serve lunch too. GREETINGS FROM SWO TREASURER, KRIS CARLSON

THANK YOU FOR YOUR GENEROSITY: Here are more details on the offerings collected at the SWO Convention and Retreat held in September at Fortune Lake. The offerings at the convention morning worship totaled \$396, split between Churchwide and the Tom and Luanne Skrenes Fund for Leaders. Regular offerings (Form A) received during the convention totaled \$888 (75% goes to Churchwide, 25% to the SWO). The Convention offering received from the Congregational Units was \$1200, split 50/50 between Churchwide and SWO. The Sunday morning Retreat personal offering was \$512, split between Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp and SWO. Offerings received for the Mkuza School totaled \$354.50. We continue to support the school with their ongoing water project and vehicle need. There was also a memorial for SWO board member Jeannette Kuziej, who passed away from cancer; we sent \$108.50 to the Ontonagon County Cancer Association. There were displays of the pillowcase dresses and the sleeping mats for the homeless; you can keep making these.

SWO President, Melzee Jacobson asked the convention participants to put \$.33 on the table in front of them. For 33 cents a day (\$10), it is a way to support the ministries of the Women of the ELCA on a consistent basis. The funds come directly from your checking account or charged to your credit card. Forms are available on the Women of the ELCA website; or I can mail you a copy if you wish. \$15.50 offering for "Faithful Friends" was collected. Again, I want to thank you for your generosity throughout the year with your Regular (Form A) Offerings, as well as Convention and Retreat offerings. As treasurer, I am the one who should receive any offerings that you are passing along to Churchwide and the Synod. My address is 304 Lake Street, Ironwood MI 49938. A Regular Offering (on Form A) makes you a "giving unit". MKUZA GIRLS' SECONDARY SCHOOL

EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH IN TANZANIA

Previously the Northern Great Lakes Synodical Women worked on a project raising money for the Mkuza Girls' School in which books were bought for their library and equipment was purchased for their science laboratory.

We again received a request for help from LilianB. Sikawa requesting assistance in raising monies to aid in pressing needs of:

- Lack of funding to extend the water from the source to other school areas.
- Securing sufficient source of power
- Securing school car for different school activities.

The estimated costs for portable water supply in the school is (cost listed in Tsh):

- Plumbing materials 3.663,000
- Construction of power house 556,000
- Buying of pumping machine 2,500,000
- Changing school electricity system from single phase to three phase 700,000
- Labor charge 1,200,000

Total 8,619,000 (US \$3,918.00)

School Car 14,000,000 (US \$6,364.00)

Our first check was submitted in the approximate amount of \$1,854.00 after the 2017 Fall Convention/Retreat.

I would like to encourage all units and individuals to prayerfully consider providing support (in any amount that is possible) and sending a check to Kris Carlson, SWO Treasurer marked for Mkuza School. With God's Help we can do this if we all pitch in together. Perhaps you can even have a fund raiser to gather funds. This year at our retreat we had donations for a used book table and were able to raise \$320.00 in donations from those who chose books from the table. Maybe a coffee fellowship after church service. I am sure that you all have creative ideas that would work.

The total need comes to \$10,282.00 and with our first check we have approximately \$8,428.00 remaining to complete the project.

Thank you all for considering action to join together to make a difference in the world and our companion synod.

This social statement was authorized by the 2009 Churchwide Assembly and here it is 2018. It is projected that the Official text of this statement will be posted online in September 2019. In December 2019, it is projected that the final statement will be published with a Spanish translation published in the winter of 2020 and a study guide published in the winter of 2021. As you can see the Social Statements of the ELCA travel over a period of years with in-depth conversation and research.

Human Trafficking

Another issue that is important to the Women of the ELCA is Human Trafficking. There was a resolution at the 2017 Triennial Convention that the Churchwide Organization (that's us ladies) would look into this issue over the next three years. Barb Rice shared the following article from the 2018 Living Lutheran Magazine with me and I would like to share it with you at this time.

A vital response to human trafficking

ELCA companions in Thailand offer new life for victims

As senior administrator of the New Life Center Foundation (NLCF), Jennifer Pedzinski's work involves shedding light on the realities of human trafficking. In doing so, she regularly encounters two misconceptions: human trafficking is all about sex and the major issue is parents who sell their children.

"While both of those things are still part of trafficking in the world, the issue is much more than that," said Pedzinski, a Baptist pastor.

The U.S. State Department defines "trafficking in persons" as "modern slavery." This can include sex trafficking, involuntary servitude, debt bondage and forced labor.

NLCF is based in Chiang Mai, Thailand, an area the State Department identifies as a high risk for human trafficking. While forced prostitution remains a major problem, labor trafficking is becoming more prevalent, Pedzinski said.

Most at risk are those who are undereducated, impoverished and lacking in professional job skills. "To find work, young and old, male and female alike are migrating out of impoverished, rural areas with little or no education to more developed areas and countries," she said. "They are recruited and offered a job. Because of

a range of factors—statelessness, illegal migration and force, threat or coercion—they end up in situations of exploitation."

The root of the issue

Much of the problem lies in human traffickers who prey upon those seeking better lives, said Franklin Ishida, ELCA director for Asia and the Pacific.

"It is often an economic issue in which people are seeking better incomes and hence get trapped," he said. For example, a growing number of people are pressed into forced labor on fishing vessels. Ishida has witnessed this while visiting the Lutheran Church in Singapore's maritime ministry.

"Workers are stuck for months on end in the open seas," he said. "At issue is that some of the fish we consume in the United States comes from that ... and it's difficult to track all this," which makes human trafficking difficult to combat.

"How do we respond as a church to the whole issue?" Ishida asked. "In the Asian context, churches tend to focus on spiritual things; in the past, they dealt less with political, social or economic issues. That is changing."

NLCF receives funding from <u>ELCA World Hunger</u> and is among the many ministries and institutions the denomination works with to combat human trafficking. The center works exclusively with young, ethnic-minority women from the Mekong subregion—Thailand, Myanmar, China and Laos—who are at risk for or are victims of human trafficking or sexual abuse.

Raising awareness

"Many of us are aware of rescue and aftercare services, but part of eradicating modern slavery is addressing the issues that feed into the problem," Pedzinski said.

Anti-trafficking campaigns in remote villages of Thailand, Myanmar and Laos educate villagers on safe migration, labor laws and human rights.

The Church of Christ in Thailand (CCT), an ELCA companion, also supports activities to raise awareness. In September its Office of Ecumenical Relations and the ELCA convened a consultation called "Countering Human Trafficking with Human Dignity in Asia Today" in Bangkok, Thailand. The event drew 59 people from Lutheran churches in Southeast Asia and the U.S.; Catholic churches, groups and charities; the Evangelical Fellowship of Thailand; the Foundation of the Seventh-Day Adventist Churches of Thailand; and nongovernmental organizations.

Attendees issued a statement titled "Mission of the Church to Prevent and Address Human Trafficking." The document named trafficking as a "global, borderless crime against humanity that is prevailing inevitably in all societies."

The document also acknowledged the millions of people worldwide subjected to human trafficking in factories, agribusinesses, home services, sexual trades and other businesses.

An estimated 3 million people per year from Myanmar, Laos, Cambodia and other countries are victims of human trafficking in Thailand. The work done in Thailand by the CCT Office of Ecumenical Relations, NLCF and other organizations is vital, the document said, as the nation is "a country of origin, transit and destination of human trafficking."

What individuals, congregations can do

January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month. The International Labor Organization estimates that 21 million people worldwide are victims of some type of forced labor. That and human trafficking's estimated \$32 billion-per-year income makes it the world's third largest crime industry, behind drugs and firearms.

Jennifer Pedzinski, senior administrator at New Life Center Foundation (NLCF) in Chiang Mai, Thailand, suggests congregations and individuals that want to help end human trafficking begin with education. "Read books. Attend conferences. Raise awareness in yourselves, your churches and your communities," she said.

To help raise awareness, the ELCA has a social message titled <u>"Commercial Sexual Exploitation."</u> <u>Women</u> of the ELCA also has offered educational exhibits on trafficking at its gatherings and has a resource titled "Understanding and responding to human trafficking."

Pedzinski also suggested seeking out reputable, transparent ministries with which to partner. <u>Cherish All</u> <u>Children</u>, for example, is an ELCA-affiliated ministry that fights human trafficking in the United States. And <u>ELCA World Hunger</u> financially supports NLCF's work.

"Do prevention work of your own, in your own community," she added. "Reduce risk right where you are by intentionally showing love and attention to the most vulnerable people [you know]."

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
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Our Purpose
