I receive the Daily Grace Devotions in my email every day. I don't always read them right away but during the end of

July and the beginning the titles caught my attention and the spirit nudged me to meditate on what they were saying. Be it understood, this are my interpretations of what I received from these devotions. You may need to read them on the Women of the ELCA website to see what they are saying to you. I am sharing as a way to provide food for thought. All Glory goes to God for inspiring each author who shared them.

Change is Coming (07/23/2020 – Phyllis Rude (2014) I know that it is not only Lutherans who have trouble with change even if we do kid with each other about it. All of us have at one time or another said I wish things would be like it was when we were children. How many of us as children believed that NOTHING would change or believe that life was much easier then? But as children we had no idea what the world looked like to our parents. My constant sameness was comfortable to me then and I would still like it to comfort me now, but it cannot. Change in my life comes with change in me, growing from a toddler to a child to an adolescent to an adult, change in my environment and circumstances surrounding my life. There is moving from from K-12 and then graduating, then asking now what. There is a different structure of live to tackle as we step out on our own, get married (and divorced perhaps), have children (or not), have a career (or have a life where we move from job to job as we move from place to place. For me the big change came at 40 when I became the matriarch of what was left after my grandparents, parents and siblings are went home to see Jesus. Change is a constant in life, and for each change there comes a little grief over the lose of what has been. I would rather choose what is comfortable as a change as to have a change force on me, but then that is part of the ups and downs of life. Through all of this God is with us and if we have faith he will walk with us through it (secret: I think he has already seen down the path and knows that we will come out on the other side a better person than before).

<u>Finding our Community</u> (07/28/2020 – Katie Brantner (2011) It is a blessing being part of a faith community, we not only learn about ourselves, we learn to understand better who we are as a child (children) of God. The way we see ourselves and one another changes, through interaction with others we discover gifts that we had never recognized before because others see them first and help nurture them. We are in a company of friends who stick with us through good and bad times, holding us up when needed and allowing us to hold them up when needed with no underlying expectations. We begin to develop passions for areas of service in which we can find ourselves living as God intends us to.

The Light of God (07/26/2020) Once we open ourselves to others, we also open ourselves to burnout a.k.a. stress a.k.a. depression. Overextending can lead to being overstressed which can lead to anxiety. Burnout can lead us to become distant, less engaged even selfisolation which leaves us with feelings of helplessness, lack of motivation and losing our sense of purpose. The devotion also states that "while stress leads to anxiety, burnout often leads to depression". Yet, in that darkness community gives us others who will listen or sit with us in that darkness. Rekindling that light is by staying close to God and each other. When helping someone in this darkness, the best thing you can do is pray with them, listen to them, let them know you are there for them, but never and I will say never try to fix it for them.....your answer to that question may come from a totally different set of circumstances.

Abundance Thinking (07/24/2020) and Stuff Abundant (07/30/2020) We have all heard about Scarcity thinking versus Abundance thinking at one time or another and often over and over through our lives. Scarcity thinking makes us think that there is never enough, it creates fear, is sneaky and pervasive. It leads us to face even the most gracious outpouring of God's gifts with fear. Sometimes it makes us look upon the church in a way that we must take care of the building first to include maintenance, bills, and begin holding back on the mission that God has called us to. God will always provide, but it is in his time not ours. Have you ever heard it this way, God made it, God owns it and we are his stewards? With scarcity thinking we will always be looking forward with worry that there is never enough instead of trusting God. When my husband started seminary, our income was cut by two-thirds. No we did not have the ability to buy everything that we thought we wanted, but there was always enough that came at the right time to take care of what we really needed. Now I understand. Abundance thinking makes us look at what we have now and know that there will always be enough to fill the need (not necessarily what WE want) and we

must give thanks for it. Which leads me into "life abundant" versus "stuff abundant" These are not the same. For the disciples Jesus sent them out with one tunic, one pair of sandals......I genuinely believe that his reasoning was for them to understand that God would provide. Abundance is a problem for many of us. Who has a closet full of clothes but nothing to wear? Which one of us does not have a consumptive habit that we need to abandon? Is learning to life a simpler life without all the gadgets such a bad thing for us to seek. I like the saying that if you have something you have not used in a year, then let it go. Now I will also say that I am still trying to live by that, not quite there yet but I am getting a little closer each day.

Measuring up (08/02/2020 – Catherine Malotky (2004) My mantra when I meet someone is "I am me, this is all you get, I am who I am" what I usually don't say is "Please be patient with me, God is not finished with me yet. My thought behind this is that I am always trying to be better, but sometimes I stumble and sometimes I find myself falling off the cliff. The faith community is a place where we should all be accepted for who we are, with all our faults and downfalls. But sometimes do you find yourself hiding in that community, revealing only the side of yourself that you think people with accept and keeping the self that we fear to reveal buried because we are less proud or just down right afraid of rejection. Through Jesus we all learn that we are loved by God unconditionally. We should be celebrating who we wholly are, we should feel free to shore what we show and what we hide without fear.

In closing I would like to say that 2020 has surrounded us with uncertainty of the future, skepticism of how things will change and fear because we cannot see what is ahead. When we are confused and living through events we have never experienced before, the Holy Spirit keeps inviting us to center ourselves in our faith and toe see that Hope, no matter what confusion is going on, is one of the most precious emotion we can have. Our job is to be quiet and listen when that Spirit is speaking to us through all the commotion. A friend of ours once said to my husband "If it were not for doubt, there would be no reason for faith". She does not remember saying it.....imagine that who do you think you used her that day?

His remarks touched our hearts since a Special Offering was taken, totaling \$800, a large amount from this congregation. People responded because they do not

want to hear of children going hungry in this land of plenty.

Then when COVID-19 hit, and schools were closed FORK went to work to provide meals for kids. Community support has been tremendous, and even large donations have been received to make sure this hunger-relief program continues its life-saving work. Behind the community support is compassion for kids. Food is life. Food is a gift from God who has compassion for this world. I like the prayer, a table grace from Lutheran World Relief. It begins with the familiar "Come Lord Jesus be our guest, let this food to us be blessed." Then it continues, "Bless be God who is our Bread, may all the world be clothed and fed."

BEFORE MY FIRST call

as a pastor, I served as a pastoral intern at a Lutheran congregation and school in Argentina. My supervisor there spoke as much English as I did Spanish (not much). Transcending the language barrier would be key.

It's hard being called to a vocation that involves authentic relationships when you lack the tools to communicate. Verbal communication is like a screwdriver with removable bits. With words you can convey love, sadness, displeasure, and curiosity. Without a shared language, I would just sit and nod during meetings, trying to catch a few words in conversation. Needless to say pastoral care was difficult.

With the school's approval, I found an activity I could lead without being able to speak the language. To connect with the students-most of whom were not part of the congregation-I led a mural-painting project. We spent recreos, or recess, with brushes in our hands, creating an original artwork that spoke to the school's Lutheran heritage and their Argentine identity. So we incorporated portraits of Martin Luther and the artist Frida Kahlo, images of baptism with the hand of God, an Argentinian flag and symbols attributed to los Pueblos Originarios (the indigenous people of Argentina). These moments were sweet, but I often felt they weren't enough. Did spending a few minutes a day together in silence really foster authentic relationships?

Then tragedy hit. Three of our students lost their lives. The school closed for several days as

the entire community gathered to celebrate the girls who had died. Groups of us walked through the town to lament at their wakes. Grieving, I returned to the mural and painted. For three hours, I sat on the empty patio and incorporated memorial ballet slippers laced into the hand of God. I posted a photo of the mural, now with the slippers, on Instagram. Students shared the image, and eventually it reached the parents who had lost their girls. The following day one of the grieving parents told a teacher he felt his daughter was present in those ballet slippers—her beautiful life represented in this simple piece of art.

Later that afternoon school staff summoned me to the patio to meet the parents of another one of the girls-the mother's only child. The father was snapping photos, while the mother stared at the image on the wall. The mother gave me a warm embrace. Her husband did the same, saying, "Thank you. Thank you." Two days earlier I'd struggled for the words to convey my sympathies; now weN-ere able to connect over this piece of art. This experience exposed me to a new way to live in relationship. As cliché as it may sound, actions do speak louder than words. Daily engaging with students through art carried more weight than small talk ever could. Lamenting with the community and painting ballet shoes spoke more to the families than anything I could have possibly said. Relationships can-and do-transcend words.

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Greetings to you in the name of Jesus our Savior! While waiting for my daughter to finish up work I heard a song on the radio. There were four words in the song that spoke to me. They are praise, awake, joy and hope these words are important for us all today. Praise God every time we can. Know that our joy comes from God. Hope is in our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ. Awake to this new day and a new time to serve all others around us. Lamentations 3:22-24 "Because of the LORD'S great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. I say to myself, 'The Lord is my portion; therefore I will wait for him.' "A prayer of thanks from <u>Christ in Our Home</u> "O Christ, thank you for your strength that holds us and empowers us for all that life brings. Amen."

In many countries in Africa, for instance, girls will have to miss school a few days each month during their menstrual cycle. With the gift of reusable pads they can attend school with confidence. This project makes us, the cutters and sewers, feel that we are empower young girls and giving them a chance to continue their education uninterrupted.

Our church wide executive board of Women of the ELCA strongly encourages congregational units to carefully monitor current state and local governmental orders and recommendations in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. At this time, we are encouraged to postpone or cancel all in-person events through the end of 2020. Maybe your cluster unit could explore virtual opportunities for gathering. If anyone has ideas in how to keep in touch with the congregations in your cluster, please share them. We still need each other!

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#### A NOTE FROM WOMEN OF THE ELCA EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR LINDA POST BUSHKOFSKY

Our purpose statement begins with the phrase "as a community of women." We gather in groups, two or three, 20 or 30, and even 2,000 or 3,000. That's one type of community, a group of people having particular characteristics in common. We are Lutheran women, acting boldly on our faith in Jesus Christ. That's what we have in common. At least before the current pandemic, different expressions of our community gathered together regularly.

There's another understanding of community: a feeling of fellowship with others that comes from sharing common attitudes, interests, goals, and, I would add, faith. And while we can't gather together in person right now, we still have a great need for the sense of community, of fellowship. So, today's #ThursdayTip offers ideas for promoting and sustaining community in the midst of a pandemic.

Gather women virtually: for a Bible study, a book discission, devotional time or even happy hour. You can do this with your synodical board, of course, but I encourage to think more broadly. Could you gather the presidents (or whatever title they have) of all the congregational units in your SWO for a virtual event? Could you open up a virtual event to anyone who wants to join? How about a virtual event for those who are new to Women of the ELCA?

Since not everyone has access to a virtual gathering, build community creatively in other ways. Phone calls with one or more women at a time support fellowship. So would a small conference call. A simple Amish circle letter would work too; one woman begins a letter and sends it on to the next woman, who continues

writing in that letter and send it on to the next woman and so forth.

Any group could identify a need in their town and invite women to meet that need, in a way that is safe under the pandemic. For instance, maybe the local women's shelter is in need of tampons and pads. Women could purchase them (from a store in person or online) and deliver them to a central location where one or two women could box them up and deliver them to the shelter. Or maybe an agency has an Amazon wish list and the group could covenant to purchase items from the wish list over a period of time, with Amazon making the delivery.

Groups that knit prayer shawls together or even groups that sew relief quilts could meet via Zoom and engage in that activity. They share fellowship while working, maybe have lunch or a snack together and get the job done.

The SWO can host some events described here. But the SWO has the responsibility to encourage ministries like these among its congregations unites. You can do that through your newsletter, your website or on your Facebook page.

What other community-sustaining ideas do you have?
