#### **AUTUMN CONSIDERATIONS**

Triennial Convention and Gathering. I'm praying that it is not dreadfully hot that week. Even so, I anticipate that most activities will be indoors, so I'll be able to enjoy our sessions and the opportunity to meet with women from all the other synods.

The following month we look forward to holding our own synodical convention and retreat at Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp. The host committee has planned a wonderful schedule of worship, Bible study and workshops, as well as a return of the massage therapists. Pastor Kelly Ylitalo will serve as our chaplain, and Maggie Hill will again provide our music. I am also eagerly awaiting a visit with my high school best friend from downstate who wanted to attend our retreat. We all should have an enriching time, and I hope the colors will still be around.

At the end of October we observe Reformation when we celebrate the reclaiming of the one true gospel that had been lost and replaced with the traditions and teachings of men. We hold fast to the three solae:

*Sola Scriptura* – the assertion that scripture must govern over church traditions and interpretations which are themselves held to be subject to scripture. All church traditions, creeds, and teachings must be in unity with the teachings of scripture as the divinely inspired Word of God.

Sola Fide – the principle that we are accounted righteous before God, only by our faith in the death and resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Sola Gratia – the recognition that our salvation is entirely a gift from God. Our salvation is not earned by our merit or good works but only by faith which is itself a gift from God through His Holy Spirit that we received at baptism. "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast." Ephesians 2:8-9

But scripture also teaches us that although we are saved by faith, we are sanctified – that is, set apart – by God for good works. The works do not in any way save us or earn us God's salvation, but we are created for the purpose of doing good works. God saved us, Jesus died for us, while we were still sinners. In gratitude, we acknowledge this grace by serving God and observing his commands, especially His command that we love one another. (continued)

Let us consider how we as Women of the ELCA's Northern Great Lakes Synod can serve God and one another. What is the Holy Spirit calling us to do? Let us plan to meet at fall and spring cluster gatherings to build up one another, to encourage all women to explore ways "to engage in ministry and action, and promote healing and wholeness in the church, the society, and the world." Be praying for our sisters in Christ at the coming conventions and retreats. And if you are called to serve in your congregations and in our Synodical Women's Organization, gladly answer "Yes, by the help of God." Step out in faith. Place your feet on the path of obedience and leave the rest to Him. Just because you say "yes" doesn't mean He's going to leave you to carry out every detail alone. He promises, "Do not be overwhelmed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you. Yes, I will help you. I will uphold you with my righteous right hand. Isaiah 41:10



#### A WORD FROM NGLSWO VICE PRESIDENT & HISTORIAN

The Hope of one person can spread into something that changes the world around us. For instance, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital was founded through the hope of Danny Thomas. Mr. Thomas was an actor, singer, comedian, philanthropist, producer, and more in the 50's -80's. He founded St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in 1962. When young Mr. Thomas was a struggling actor, he put his last \$7 into the collection plate and prayed that he would find his way in life. Danny asked St. Jude to help him. St. Jude is the patron saint of desperate cases and lost causes, which is what he felt like at that time, but he had hope for the fu-



ture. He promised to make a shrine to St. Jude and thus he named the hospital after that saint when his prayer was answered. Of course, I am summarizing here and more information can be found at <u>Stjude.org/directory/t/danny-thomas-founder.html?sc\_icid=our-history-danny.</u>

I first found an interest in St. Jude when I saw Danny Thomas' daughter, Marlo Thomas in a commercial. She is now the National Outreach Director for the hospital. She is also a star and has written books and received awards for her own philanthropy. Interestingly, both Marlo and her father were born in Michigan. I noticed that she was so sincere and passionate in her discussions of the hospital that it made me look into the story of her father's dedication to building this shrine to St. Jude. Mr. Thomas fulfilled his hopeful promise through the Holy Spirit. God, through the Spirit, spread that hope to his daughter, Marlo Thomas. She now continues the work because of the hope she saw in her father and still sees in the children and families who are helped by St. Jude.

The hospital has contributed to immunization work around the world as well as raising the survival rate for childhood cancer from 20% to 80%, with this goal: "We won't stop until no child — anywhere — dies from cancer. By 2030, our goal is to cure at least 60% of children with six of the most common kinds of cancer worldwide. With your support, St. Jude can provide cutting-edge treatment at no cost to families."
