A Disastrous Winter

As I sit here in mid-February, composing my article for this March issue, I am reflecting on the strange winter we have been "gifted" by El Niño. We had no snow (except for some minor flurries) over the Thanksgiving weekend, hardly any snow by Christmas Eve, a dump of snow that disappeared with a week-long warm spell in the 40s and 50s (!) in January. Our ground is finally white once more, but on Valentine's Day/Ash Wednesday we have a high of 40 degrees. I just don't know what to make of it. And sadly, neither do the local businesses—motels, air BnBs, bars, etc. The local

economy is suffering greatly from this uncharacteristically mild winter. Looks like folks will be giving up snowmobiling for Lent.

However, word from my daughter in California is that we are not bearing the worst of it. The Los Angeles area has been getting record rainfalls that have triggered over 475 massive mudslides from hills denuded of vegetation by wildfires. Deep flows of mud have slammed into houses, smashing through walls and even shoving houses off their foundations. The San Francisco area has experienced very high winds that have toppled trees and downed power lines. Nature's power to destroy is terrifying.

But in addition to natural disasters are the man-made crises we are witnessing around the world. The wars in Ukraine and Gaza have killed innocent people, left populations terrorized and homeless, and have driven refugees from their homelands. This is not new. Every year we see similar devastation all over the globe.

What can we women--we Christians--do in response? First, we must fall on our knees and pray to our God to bring comfort and relief to suffering people. Then we must explore ways that we can be God's hands in the face of such great need. Many of our women's groups make quilts that are sent by Lutheran World Relief to people who need the enveloping warmth of a quilt's "hug." We can also assemble personal care kits for distribution by LWR. We can send our monetary contributions to Lutheran Disaster Relief and other caring organizations.

During this season of Lent we need to spend time on self-reflection. We must examine where we can step up our efforts to spread God's love in our communities, our country, and around the globe. Remember, we must confess our sins of omission as well as commission. Where have we failed to act? Let us all seek ways where we can make a difference--not wasting our talents and resources--so God can tell us at the end, "Well done, good and faithful servant."



A WORD FROM NGLSWO VICE PRESIDENT & HISTORIAN

In respect to the history of the Women of the ELCA, our Foremothers have made significant impacts including, but not limited to the following:

"The magazine *Lutheran Woman Today* began publishing in January 1988 and *Newsletter* (the predecessor to *Interchange*) followed in June of that year. The organization's first website was inaugurated in 1995. *Café*, our electronic magazine for young

women launched in 2006, with podcasts soon to follow. In 2011, *Lutheran Woman Today* changed its name to *Gather*, and continued providing award-winning content (Bible studies and articles) to more than 45,000 readers, with a pass-along rate of 3 additional people per subscriber. The organization's first smart phone app, <u>Daily Grace</u>, was unveiled in 2011 (available for IOS and Android), the same year that the magazine took on a new name, *Gather*. Various program initiatives were launched in 1988, some of which continue to-day such as our <u>scholarship program</u>. Initiatives came and went, meeting the needs of the women at the time. <u>Raising Up Healthy Women and Girls</u>, the organization's health initiative, began in 2005. <u>Bold Women's Day</u>, an annual celebration of our mission and the women who accomplish it, launched in 2007."

I have seen the Northern Great Lakes SWO make an impact in the lives of women through the bonds of friendship and support. My mother, who moved to the U.P. 65+years ago, was welcomed into the community as well as the congregation of the ELCA church in Iron Mountain, MI, by a couple of these wonderful Women of the ELCA. Over 65 years later, through many ups and downs, they are still friends. These women support one another, pray for each other (and their families), teach, preach and lead one another. They share their strengths and lean on one another in their weak moments. These beautiful connections are rare, especially these days.

I love to remember those times and have found those lasting, beautiful connections for myself among our Synodical Women's Organization today. Spread the word and invite women to access these resources and bonds that last.



NEWS FROM IRON-GOGEBIC-ONTONAGON (IGO) CLUSTER 1

The members of Zion and Salem Women of the ELCA Units have joined together to share in hosting events for the cluster and offering other activities for their individual units. Covid created a large dry spell for fellowship and activities, and it took us a while to get back into the swing of things. We hope that what we have been able to do will boost interest in other groups in the cluster to regain some momentum in women's activities within their churches and the cluster. Our unit leaders include Kris Carlson (Salem), Sue Hill (Sharon) and Melzee Jacobson (Salem). Our SWO Board Liaison is JoAnn Nurmi (All Saints).

Last Spring (Sunday, April 23, 2023) Zion and Salem women hosted our first spring cluster meeting since the end of the pandemic. We met at Zion Lutheran Church for a presentation (more of a question-andanswer discussion) on Discipleship. We discussed thoughts of what the word meant to each of us, that there is a study published by Churchwide on the subject and even talked about spiritual gifts. There were 13 attendees. A light supper was provided.

Another activity that took place at Salem was a collection of good winter socks for the homeless. We used a Thrivent Choice grant and purchased winter socks from a local merchant, who also donated some socks that they were no longer selling to the cause. Members from Zion and Salem collected socks, and some were given locally to groups who could use them and the others were taken to Duluth for distribution through a site that was local.

The two units are meeting monthly on the 1st Thursday of the month. We hope to vary times throughout the year. On the First Thursday of December 2023, we joined together and had a Christmas Tea at Salem with finger foods and several varieties of tea flavors. We sang Christmas Carols and decorated premade Christmas cards along with having donated hand-made special cards from our active card making group. We collected nonperishable items which added up to 54 pounds that was taken to St. Vinnies along with the cards to be given to families that were served. It worked out wonderfully because as we were finishing up the Little Finland Chorus was performing across the street at Our Lady of Peace, so many ladies attended that also. We held a Christmas tea last year for the ladies from Zion and Salem and we had approximately 30+ attend. This year we invited members from All Saints, Sharon, St. John's, and St Paul and we hosted 40. We experienced good fellowship, good food and enjoyed the activities.

This Spring our IGO Cluster meeting will be held at All Saints Lutheran Church and will be hosted by the ladies from Sharon and All Saints. Our theme will be Bloom Where You Are Planted. It will be held on Sunday May 19th starting at 1:30 pm CT in the fellowship hall. A light supper will be provided. Our plan is to invite a Master Gardener to do a presentation on gardening. We hope that all the churches will publicize in their newsletters the information that will be forwarded covering this event. Whether your unit is active or not, you are still invited to attend the cluster events. We also want you to know that there are now six formats for having a unit that can be used. The unit leaders would be happy to help you to obtain a copy of this and work with you in bringing your unit back into action.

We may be older and a little more tired, but we still have things that we can do to work in God's mission fields. Just remember that God Loves You and that We do too and He is still calling you to follow Him.
