The class is BOTH a conversation around the roles of the church as refuge, mediator, or prophetic voice in times of political and cultural discontent, as well as honing our skills for speaking the truth in love through the practice of “Public Deliberative Dialog.”

This structured process can help individuals better understand one another’s point of view, without moving farther apart, into corners of division. This practice is most effective in-person, but we will also offer a Zoom curated space for those unable to be together in-person. This work is from the early work of the Public Deliberation Initiative.

Many Americans find the Middle East incomprehensible. Why is the area that we Christians refer to as the Holy Lands seemingly forever held captive to violence, oppression, and war? This is the region of the world where God chose to directly engage his people. Why does there seem to be today so much human suffering and hate emanating from it? As Christians we can choose to detach the Gospel from the setting

where it occurred but we lose something meaningful when we do so. If conversely, we choose to engage more deeply the region, its people, its culture, and its practice of religion, we may gain a new, rich perspective on the Bible and the Gospel message. The course will focus on exploring these and other questions, including how our Christian faith applies to current events in the Middle East.
