For two and a half years, my husband and I successfully avoided contracting COVID-19. We wore masks, stayed away from gatherings, quarantined after a suspected exposure, and basically did what we were supposed to do to avoid getting the virus. And we were successful...until this month. It started with a tickle in the throat, then came the fever and chills, then the difficult decision of whether to nap on the couch or sit in the chair or just go to bed. As of this writing, we have emerged from our COVID cave and are now back amongst the living...sort of. We are still moving slow. Processing thought or coming up with complete sentences is still a challenge. As many people who have had COVID-19 will tell you, a kind of fog settles in, like a congestion of the brain.

But enough of that. I write to share with you some wonderings about COVID-19 and the Church. It is no secret that people are tired, but until I contracted COVID, I hadn't really considered its physical toll and its impact on ministry. I believe we have all witnessed how COVID-19 has impacted our spirits, our emotions, our sense of community, and a certain heightened anxiety about what all this means. But physically...no wonder volunteerism is at an historic low! When even brushing one's teeth or making supper expends all energy reserves, I can see why there's not much strength left to lead Vacation Bible School, take a turn for the Altar Guild, or sing in the choir. Such extra activity, at least for a time, is truly beyond one's physical capacity.

And yet, this too shall pass. Energy will return. Creativity and strength and the resolve to contribute will slowly but surely gain momentum in my body and spirit. And not just for me, but for us, and our efforts together as congregations and as a synod together. It seems to me that we are collectively in this space of healing, waiting for restoration and renewal. Whether or not you have had

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to deal with the physical impact of COVID-19, I think we are all painfully aware of a certain disease. People continue to be polarized concerning social and political issues. Some notice that in-person worship attendance or giving has not returned to pre-pandemic levels and we wonder what that means for the future of our church. We talk about wanting to move forward and yet long to be back where we were, which if we are honest. was still a place of decline and anxiety.



So where does that leave us? In truth, I believe we are still where we have always been, invited to participate in what God is doing in the world. I remind you and myself of what intellectually we already know, but perhaps emotionally and spiritually are challenged to own, that our Church, and your church, belong to God. And the body of Christ that you are a part of lives and breathes because God would have it be so. We rely on God to put in us a new and right spirit. We rely on the Holy Spirit to show us the way, to energize our efforts, and focus our mission to further the work of Christ.

In these days of healing and discernment, as we wait for renewal and even joy, I know that momentum is building. Congregations are considering their next steps, new plans for ministry are being made, people are emerging from isolation hungry for community and meaningful spiritual connection. As the Body of Christ in the world, we have something of value to offer. Whether your congregation provides an opportunity for deeper engagement or simply gives permission to be still and receive a word of hope and healing, the Church, your church, is meant to be a blessing.

May God bless you with the joy of salvation and sustain you with a willing spirit.

Your Justice, My Justice, God's Justice

"He has told you, O mortal, what is good, and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" Micah 6:8 (NRSV)

All of us have our favorite Bible passages. Many people like John 3:16 and Psalm 23. Lutherans especially like Ephesians 2:8-10. (Note: I am intentionally not writing out the full verses. I encourage you to look them up yourselves!)

All of the verses in the Bible can't possibly hold equal weight when compared to each other. Compare Leviticus 24:14 with John 8:7. All of us have a "canon within the canon." We all have Bible passages that more fully express our Christian faith and our sense of how we see ourselves and the world. Martin Luther especially liked to view scripture through the lens of Christ. "Was Christum treibt," was his saying in German, which basically means, "What conveys Christ."


Micah 6:8 is a passage that seems popular today in many religious circles, even among non-Christians. It is an ancient text dating back to the prophet Micah of the 8th century BCE during a time of religious and political unrest. What is new about that? It's pretty amazing to see the resonance of this verse today. I, along with many, would consider Micah 6:8 to be part of my "canon with the canon," one of my seminal verses from the Bible. My *New Oxford Annotated Bible*, 3rd edition from 2001, has the following footnote on this passage: "In this single sentence the prophet sums up a century of brilliant prophesy." Wow, that's some high praise for a single verse of scripture!

I see within the simple structure of this single verse, three foundational pillars:


- 1. Do Justice
- 2. Love Kindness
- 3. Walk Humbly with God

Who doesn't want more justice in the world? Well, maybe not everyone, especially when pursuit of justice could affect my own status in what I might perceive as deleterious to me. Whose justice shall we act upon? My sense of justice? Your sense of justice? Or God's sense of justice? What system or course of action can best achieve the most justice for the most people for the longest time? Debating these questions is what causes division and confusion. But it can also move us down the path to God's justice. It seems to me that we have to ask these questions, and we do well to acknowledge the complexity of the paths to justice.

Perhaps, **my sense of justice** in a given situation will go directly from point A to point B. While **your sense of justice** will go from point A to point



C, then finally to point B. A state of justice is reached, but a different route is taken to get there.



I propose we view these 3 pillars as equally integral parts of a 3-legged stool. All are important in maintaining the balance of the stool and for God's justice to be realized.

- If I only pursue justice on my terms without kindness and humility, I risk being "right" and needlessly damaging people in the pursuit of my goal.
- If I only seek to be kind without humbly seeking justice, I can become very irrelevant to real life circumstances.
- If I only seek humility without pursuing justice with kindness, I can give away any sense of my agency to make the world a better place.

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Holding these 3 foundational pillars (justice, kindness, humility) are integral in dealing with our real-world challenges. Thanks be to God that it is God's justice that is ultimately at stake. I don't have a perfect sense of God's justice and neither do you. Let's keep this in mind as we deal with not only the challenging issues of our time, but also in dealing in a more humane and godly manner with each other as together we seek God's justice to be done on earth as it is in heaven!

Leadership Learnings: NGLS Resources

Are you a leader in your congregation? Are you a council member or a congregation officer? Did you know that there are helpful resources for leaders at the Northern Great Lakes Synod website? And, are you aware that your synod leadership has been offering short workshops every three months with helpful topics for congregation leaders? The next workshop will be Thursday, September 8 at 7 pm ET/6 pm CT via Zoom and will focus on congregation budget and finance issues. The Zoom link will be sent to each congregation's office a few days before the workshop. If you want to attend, ask your church office staff to email you the Zoom meeting link.



The topics for the five workshops for leaders that have been presented so far are listed below in the order of occurrence.

- Leading a Council Meeting: How to be an Effective Leader of Meetings
- Our Corner of the Church: How the Three Church Expressions Fit Together
- How Portico is Beneficial to Congregations and Staff
- The Value of a Vibrant Mutual Ministry
- Why Have Congregation Policies and What Topics Should They Cover

Each 90-minute workshop has a short update from synod leadership followed by a *Dwelling in the Word* devotion. The topic of the workshop is then introduced and a 15 to 20-minute recorded PowerPoint presentation is shown followed by a time for questions and discussion. While the first part of the discussion period focuses on the workshop topic, the second part provides time to discuss any issue that an attendee wants to bring up.



This year I look forward to a great year in the classroom and in the kitchen, on the sidelines and in the sanctuary with young adults who are blessed to be receiving a degree from an ELCA institution of higher learning.
