Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod,

As I write this, today is election day. I hear from some people that they are very anxious about this; anxious about outcomes, anxious about potential violence, anxious about accusations of voter fraud or refusals to accept results. And from others, it is business as usual as I believe, in many of our communities, people know who their election officials are. Neighbors are behind the desk at polling locations. Familiar faces are overseeing the voting booths. I'd like to think that we have a deeper sense of trust in voting procedures and processes where we live than perhaps in more urban areas.

Whether you trust the process in your community or not, I think we all know that we are at a place in the history of our country where the political seams are showing, and the fabric of society is even ripping apart in some places, leaving holes and frayed edges. We, as a country, are not "living in harmony with one another."

Truthfully, I'm not sure that's possible. I still hope for civility, but I do not expect harmony. However, I do hope for harmony in our communities of faith, so that with one voice we can glorify God, and with joined effort, we can partner together in ministry.

I've heard from a few of our congregations that "people leave their politics at the door." Certainly, our congregations are not the place for campaigning, but can they be a place of civil discourse? Not so that one person can badger another person into agreement, but so that as people of faith we can wrestle together with issues that are complex and multi-layered. Where else can people of faith struggle together with what it means to be people of faith, when opinions vary about what a faithful response is?

It seems to me that the polar opposite extremes of any given issue are the only voices at the microphone or on the news. I have no idea what the results of the midterm election will be, nor what that

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result will mean moving into the future. Since we are both citizens of the world and children of the kingdom of God, the way forward is far from clear. I hope that it is possible to discuss, discern, and consider together what it means to live in harmony given differing opinions about politics. And I offer a word of caution, that the extreme voice seeks to demonize the opposition, and no one is as bad, or as good, as any advertisement or media spot or Facebook post seeks to make them out to be.

It seems to me that the last decades have seen an eroding sense of trust in government, authority, and institutions, including the Church, including your church. I don't know how to build up trust in government, but your witness can help to rebuild trust in people of faith and what it means to be Christian.

I therefore ask you, encourage you, exhort you, to give witness in your community to your faith in Christ Jesus, not just in how you vote, but in how you treat each other, how you speak about those with whom you disagree, and how you live your faith in every day. While much of what Jesus said is not so clear, his actions and his call to follow could not be more explicit. Jesus gives us the mandate to love, to serve, to feed his sheep. We are to advocate for the forgotten, lift up the lowly, see the overlooked, welcome the excluded, love God by loving our neighbor. It is as easy and as difficult as that.



As congregations once again gather around tables for coffee fellowship and conversation, I hope we can renew friendships and deepen relationships, old and new, so that at least in our communities of faith we can find common ground and listen better to each other than the rest of the society seems to be able to manage. As siblings in Christ, as people bound

together as Christ's own body, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." (Romans 15:13, Advent 2)



One of my favorite books is Viktor Frankl's, *Man's Search for Meaning*. Recently I saw that familiar quote from his book, "When we are no longer able to change a situation, we are challenged to change ourselves." I recall my campus pastor at Wartburg College, Larry Trachte, who often quoted from Frankl and did special studies on Logotherapy. How do I find meaning during so many challenges in my church duties as Assistant to the Bishop and Director for Evangelical Mission? There are more and more situations regarding local churches, the national church, and society in general that I simply cannot change. To what degree do I accept those things I cannot change and instead focus on my functioning and reflecting on my emotional relationships to these varied tasks and roles? All of this is a work in progress for me.

So many of our natural emotional desires are to control and influence the other. I was never a biological parent, but I see parents wishing to influence their children in a manner that results in behavior in line with their own values. As a math teacher for 12 years, I saw the amazing "dances" of parents dealing with their child and teacher. Often at a parent/teacher conference I would hear: "Oh, I wasn't good at math either." While acknowledging that this attitude could be consciously or unconsciously influencing their child to under function in their math classes, I needed to work from my standards and individualize instruction as much as reasonably possible. If my preconceived notion of pedagogy didn't work well for a child, I had the power to change my approach. I worked hard at not cutting myself off from the student. Yet, at the end of the day, I tried not to feel as if the learning process was entirely up to me.

When we see fewer people coming to worship services and volunteering to serve parish ministries, do we automatically seek to change them? Do we actually believe that we can "fix" others?

Rabbi Ed Friedman offers this perspective: "There is the ultimate spiritual concept, which is: 'Unless you are focusing on the spiritual side of you, there is just no way you can promote it in others."

What are you working on to change about yourself and thereby grow spiritually? How are you avoiding the emotional trap of trying to change everyone else, but not working on your own functioning?

Jesus said that I have come that you might have life and have it abundantly. Perhaps by not obsessing about changing others, we might find more "life" that is ultimately more abundant and thus attractive to others. We likely will not "debate or argue" others into the Kingdom of God. Let the work of God begin with us as we each seek to better ourselves as followers of Christ the Lord.

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Good Governance Requires Keeping Up to Date

The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines governance as, "the act or process of overseeing the control and direction of something (such as a country or an organization)." In Romans 12:6-8, Paul writes about how we each have different gifts, according to the grace given to us. If it is leadership, let one govern diligently.

An organization like the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America needs a foundation of good

operate functionally and cohesively. The established

governance documents of the ELCA not only reflect the theology and polity of our Church, but also set the solid foundation needed to carry out our primary mission of preaching the Word, sharing the sacraments, reaching out to our neighbors with the good news, and sharing God's love in the world. One very important document, the "Model Constitution for Congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America" is the foundation document for each ELCA congregation's governance structure.

I believe we all recognize the value of having a solid governance structure. Without accepted guidance documents like constitutions, bylaws, resolutions, and policies, leaders of our country as well as leaders in our Church could take us in directions that do not reflect the desires of the collective body. However, good governance also includes the ability to adapt to changing needs and evolving realities. As such, governance documents for our congregations must be "living documents" that are periodically reviewed and updated.

Every three years the ELCA has a Churchwide

Assembly where decisions are made regarding policies, mission, direction, and budgets of the Church. The 2022 Assembly in Columbus, Ohio, included approval



and ratification of changes to the constitutions of the ELCA, including the "Model Constitution for Congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America." This means every congregation should at a minimum now update their own constitution to match the required changes in the model constitution. Additionally, if your congregation has not reviewed and updated their own constitution in the past 5 years, your synod leadership recommends you not only amend it to meet the new model, but you also review and, if needed, amend it to meet the current needs and realities of your congregation.

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In another article in this edition of *Northern Light*, Nancy Heykes, our Synod Secretary goes into more detail about the process to update your congregation's constitution. She also directs you to resources that will be helpful as you tackle the task to keep this very important governance document updated.

In his article, Synod Vice President Chuck Thomas notes the importance of keeping our congregation governance documents up to date. Your congregation's governing documents (constitution, bylaws and continuing resolutions) are an important framework for your ministry. The ELCA maintains a *Model Constitution for Congregations* that contains required and non-required provisions that keep us up to date with changes in ministry at the churchwide level, such as new rostered ministry roles and improvements at the local level that help us address our changing congregation situations.



Some congregations used the "down time" during the pandemic to work on constitution amendment projects. However, it appears that 20% of our NGLS congregations have constitutions that haven't been updated for over 20 years, and an additional 20% haven't been updated for 10 years.



Our NGL Synod Constitution Committee is here to help you update and improve your governance documents. Our advice to congregations who haven't updated in many years is to start fresh with the latest version of the *ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations*, posted on the Synod website (nglsynod.org) in the Congregation Council Resources tab.

All changes to congregation constitutions need to be approved by the Synod before becoming effective, so we also recommend that congregations send us their draft changes <u>before</u> scheduling a congregation meeting vote. Our

committee reviews each submitted constitution and provides feedback on any edits that need to be made to achieve Synod approval and suggestions and recommendations for other sections.

The committee has set up a submission schedule so a congregation will know in advance how long it will take to receive review and feedback. As you plan your revision project, please note that it's not uncommon for major constitution rewrites to go through two cycles of review and comment before approval.



12	Pray for those who are bound by the chains of self-harm, self-doubt and insecurities. Open their hearts and minds to the power of the Holy Spirit.
13	Pray for the Synod Council meeting today and tomorrow with participants throughout the Synod joining the discussion via Zoom. Guide them through their reports, recommendations, resolutions, and responsibilities.
14	Pray that love truly does conquer all and remind us daily, "In everything, do to others what you would have them do to you."

15	Pray for those who are mourning the loss of a loved one. Give them comfort in their memories and support from those who will walk with them through their grief.
16	As we observe Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday, pray for our nation and our world. Pray that divisions based on race, culture, and faith that still exist among us may be overcome, not by power and violence, but by love for all of God's children.

21	Pray for all those whose work requires travel including bus drivers, truck drivers, delivery drivers and others who spend hours on the road. Grant them patience as they navigate winter driving conditions.
22	Pray for those who are struggling under the weight of personal and professional challenges. Put them on a healing path and shine a light on their destination so they may clearly see the way out from under their burdens.
23	Pray for teachers at all levels who enlighten, enrich and encourage a life-long love of learning. May all teachers be fair, honest and open to enhancing their own knowledge.
24	Pray for our Synod Staff as they meet. Grant them guidance, wisdom and support as they engage in meaningful discussion.

College Students...Need Your Hands

When I was a freshman in college, first semester, there was a moment when I realized I had gone more than four weeks without a hug. This was my first month away from home. I didn't know my friends well enough to be on a hugging basis. I didn't have a significant other. And I don't think that I even realized how much I had missed that very basic human need for touch until...someone held my hand.

It was in Sunday worship at Bethel Lutheran church, and they had a practice that was unique to their congregation, or at least I had never seen it: when they said the Lord's Prayer, the entire congregation held hands. Stretching across the rounded sanctuary space, arthritic hands held strong calloused hands, which



grasped sticky young hands, which grabbed onto my 19-year-old hands, which had not felt another human touch in nearly 30 days. And it was the most amazing thing. For the first time, I noticed that the words of the Lord's Prayer are in the plural (*our Father*...give *us* our daily bread). I noticed how much my heart had been missing this very basic thing, of human interaction. And, I noticed how my spirit had been longing for a community of love and care, even though my mind had not made any such connection.

I'm not sure whether Bethel Lutheran will ever know how their simple act of holding my hand impacted me. But it has forever made me wonder: who is it that needs a hand to hold right now?

The students at Finlandia amaze me. So many of them show up to Hancock from places far away, places that have never seen snow(!), away from their families, their cultures, everything familiar. Here they take on the task of educating themselves, at a *sisu*-filled university named Finlandia. Some of them have families holding their hands virtually, from afar – though more than a few are on their own in the world, and have been for some time before showing up here. As they get to know one another, the students hold each other's hands, helping one another navigate classes and finding resources, providing humor and sometimes a referral when they know their friend needs help. The faculty and staff show up to accompany and hold space for students, through their presence and wisdom and guidance, daily.

Who needs a hand in the world, right now? I wonder this in the most positive way. Hand holding is a part of life; it's how we get through, and I think it is a call that Christians hear when our ears are attuned to Christ at work in the world.

Who need *your* hands right now? So. Many. People. If you would keep the students of Finlandia in your prayers as well as the staff/faculty who support them, that is one way to lend a hand in a significant way. Or if you wanted to volunteer your hands to help with our Community Meal (every Monday evening) that is another way. Finally, financial gifts are always welcome to Campus Ministry or Finlandia in general, to give the university a hand up in our mission: We are seeking to form leaders who are called and empowered, to serve the neighbor, so that all might flourish. Northern Great Lakes Synod, *you* are invited to join us in this vital and important mission.

May God bless your hands, as you bless the world daily through them.
