Welcome to the Year of our Lord 2024! In this new year, I announce our Synod themes for the next three years,

Seed Sowers:

2024: I Planted 2025: Apollos Watered 2026: God gave the Growth



Last year at Synod Assembly, Seed Sowers was the theme for our inaugural Seed Sowers Luncheon that thanked people who had made a planned gift (meaning that they remembered NGLS/ELCA in their will) or were considering doing so. In essence, they were a "Seed Sower," planting seeds for future ministry, seeds that they knew they would not see grow and bear fruit.

However, being a Seed Sower is not limited to those who have planned a legacy gift. After all, are we not all Seed Sowers? Do we not, all of us, plant seeds for future ministry, even as we enjoy the growth from seeds that were planted generations ago?

community of faith has accomplished that for which it was created and has completed that for which it was purposed. God will bring new life and growth from the seeds that St. James will plant. Renewing Relationships and Making New Friends in Tanzania

I was privileged to accompany Dr. Danielle Anderson, Rev. Brahm Semmler Smith, and Stephanie Smith (no relationship to Pastor Brahm) on a visit to our companion diocese in Tanzania—the Eastern and Coastal Diocese. This past October, we spent about two weeks in Tanzania renewing relationships and making new friends. We saw many of the ministries of the Eastern and Coastal Diocese.

The Northern Great Lakes Synod has an over 30-year companionship relationship with the Eastern and Coastal Diocese which is part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania. Many people from our synod have traveled to Tanzania in various capacities—work crews, teacher exchanges, church companionship. The ELCT is now larger than the ELCA in membership. The church is growing in Tanzania, but is not without its own challenges. We have much to learn from each other.

Hospitality is probably the first word that comes to mind when thinking of our experience in Tanzania. We were well-cared for and were welcomed to witness their lives. We were welcomed in the name of Christ. We experienced great music and worship and passion for their faith and tangible efforts to serve others in Jesus' name.

I offer in this article some highlights along with pictures of this experience in Tanzania. If your congregation already has a companion congregation in Tanzania, I encourage you to keep that relationship up through regular correspondence. And, you may even choose to visit Tanzania or host visitors from Tanzania! Kisarawe Lutheran Jr. Seminary—A Boarding School for Teenagers

Headmaster Maxon is a young man who is passionate to make improvements both in the infrastructure and the quality of

instruction. They strive to offer physical, mental and spiritual growth for all students. Mr Maxon gave us a strategic plan for improvements. He showed me pictures of how over the years our synod has supported this place through work crews. The library is named after former Bishop Skogman, one dormitory named after former Bishop Skrenes, and one dormitory named after Rev. Bob Langseth. We also were blessed to witness and participate in graduation ceremonies. The pride of the students and families was on display!

A picture of Pastor Bob Langseth and his wife Deloris stands in the library which he and many others from the Northern Great Lakes Synod help build. The headmaster of Kisarawe offered condolences as Pastor Langseth's funeral was ironically the same day as my visit. Pastor Langseth was affectionately known by many in Tanzania as "Pastor Tembo" (Swahili word for "elephant"—a nod to his booming voice and playful portrayal of an elephant).





A Maasai Worship Service

The Maasai are the traditional hunters and herders of Tanzania. Some of them are moving from rural areas to the capital city of Dar es Salaam. The Lutheran church is helping with literacy training. We celebrated the "graduates" of that training! We experienced traditional Maasai dancing and music during the worship service!

A Growing Church

I was honored to preach and be with Bishop Malasusa and the people of Gide parish. The 4 hour celebration included many choirs, brass band, prayers and offerings. Even a goat was presented to Bishop Malasusa. God bless the Gide parish and Pastor Elisabeth as they complete their roof!!





Interfaith and Peace Efforts on Zanzibar

The Lutheran Church is small in numbers on the island of Zanzibar, but it's Upendo House and Inter-faith peace efforts include a vocational training school for girls to learn sewing and business skills. Most of the students are Muslim.

Mtoni Health Dispensary, Maternity and Dental Clinic

The Eastern and Coastal Diocese supports medical facilities like that at Mtoni. This health dispensary provides basic medical care. There is also a new maternity ward. The dental clinic welcomed a new modern dental chair, and there are hopes for a sustainable model of dental care for people who often don't have a chance to receive dental care.





Mkuza Girls School

Mkuza is a boarding school for girls sponsored by the Eastern and Coastal Diocese with a current enrollment of about 200. Plans are to expand to 400. The Women of the Northern Great Lakes Synod have a long history of supporting Mkuza. The headmistress, Mercy Nyka, gave us a tour and thanked us for our support.

Mlandizi Vocational Center for Adults

The diocese has built a vocational training center for adults with special needs. Carolina Shedafa

showed us this amazing facility that should open in January. Adults will be housed here and learn a skill that matches their abilities and offers them a sense of dignity. Endowment Funds from the Skrenes Ministry Fund have helped this effort.

Bishop Alex Malasusa is a longtime friend of the Northern Great Lakes Synod. Bishop Malasusa was elected as bishop of the whole Lutheran Church in Tanzania.



CARING for CREATION

The land region of the Northern Great Lakes Synod is plentiful in trees, streams, lakes, wildlife, and gorgeous scenery; all providing countless opportunities for outdoor recreation and enjoyment. This wondrous gift from God needs our care. Indeed, it seems that today it is critical that we embrace the challenge to protect and restore God's creation. A recent response to this challenge is a small step taken by Milwaukee County, Wisconsin. This past October, they passed a "Rights of Nature" resolution supporting the movement to protect nature.

Protecting creation is foundational to our existence. It states in Genesis 2:15 (NIV): "The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and to take care of it." The study note in my NIV study bible says by this action man has been charged to responsibly govern the earth under God's sovereignty. So how does Genesis 2:15 apply to us as Christians today?

There is an ELCA advocacy study guide titled "Why Lutherans Care for Creation" that speaks directly to the question posed above. I encourage everyone to read the study guide and learn about key aspects of Lutheran theology and practice regarding "creation-justice."

As you read, you will explore the concepts of God the Creator, how humans fit in God's creation, and how worship, sacraments, justification, and vocation all tie together with God's creation. The study guide also explores how the Church is caring for creation through our various justice advocacy and worldwide ministry endeavors. The guide closes with a challenge for all of us to renew and re-form our church to embrace "the care and redemption of all that God has made."

As we begin the new year, 2024, let's think about the wonders of God's creation and all the enjoyment it provides.
