Shining with the Light of Christ in the Northern Great Lakes Synod

Dear People of the Northern Great Lakes Synod,

I'm on Facebook. I do not comment often, unless it is to wish someone a "Happy Birthday". I see recipes and gardening tips, anniversary announcements and pictures of baptisms. I also see people I know and love posting polarizing memes that demonize those with whom they disagree. And I suspect the post that was shared can trace its origin to those countries most



interested in sowing seeds of discord and division in our country.

It is concerning, especially as we journey towards our November elections and all that is at stake in our votes.

I do not write to tell you how to vote. That is not the way of the ELCA Lutheran Christian. I *do* write to encourage you to be mindful of how you engage in conversation and discernment leading up to this year's election. There are people in your congregation who love you and who disagree with you. Will you demonize them? Will you lump them in with those you deem to be unworthy? Or will you extend grace, be kind, and forgive them for not agreeing with you?

Abraham Lincoln, who shepherded the United States through the Civil War, stated, "America will never be destroyed from the outside. If we falter and lose our freedoms, it will be because we destroyed ourselves."

I hope and pray that as tensions rise, as political lines are drawn, as alliances are declared, that our communities of faith will remain places of civil discourse, open conversation, and unified in our commitment to

proclaim Christ and work for his mission.



We are first and foremost citizens of the kingdom of God – not Republicans, not Democrats, not Independents. The lens we apply to politics is that of the open tomb, to weigh and assess the policies and positions of candidates based on how well they align with the priorities and example of Jesus. This, of course, is not so easily done. But the task becomes easier if we

consider what is important with others, in our community of faith, employing conversation, prayer, and debate that allows for mutual respect in the midst of varying perspectives.

I encourage you to be careful of what you post and find out first:

- Is it true? Check the news source.
- Who generated the post?
 Do not be an unwitting accomplice to outside influencers.
- Does it further the conversation? Or simply drop an emotional zinger meant to inflame and increase anxiety.





Keep in mind that conversation around such important and complicated subjects is best held in person. Social media provides a distance that reduces meaningful discussion to soundbites and allows people to be their worst selves. Do not be your worst self. It is at

times such as this that the Church and your church can be a place of not just civility, but of safety and hope. Whatever the election results, whatever the reaction to those results, we, the body of Christ, will continue to be united in ministry for the sake of the one who died and rose to save.... even those who nailed him to the cross. By the grace of God, our forgiveness will be just as inclusive and will bear witness to the power of Christ to heal, to reconcile, and to find a way forward...together.

"We've Been Here Before"

In my two previous articles for the Northern Light, I noted that there is value in reflecting on the past. There is value for Christians and the church to reflect on how Christians and the church have lived and spoken in the context of their own time frames. Reading the book of Acts and the challenges and amazing fluidity of the early church, we can find strength and hope in truly understanding that God's people have been here before—both through the good and the bad. The players may have changed, but the basic patterns of life and humanity are amazingly similar.

For this article, I'm sharing some perspectives from the third bishop of the Northern Great Lakes Synod, Thomas Skrenes (Bishop 1999-2017). And, I'm sharing some perspectives from our current Bishop, Katherine Finegan (Bishop 2017 to present).

In the February 2007 edition of "Northern Lights-Notes and Quotes", Bishop Skrenes reflected on anxiety about congregations needing pastors. He wrote the following:

Needing pastors is nothing new for this synod. In my 15 years of working in the synod office, I have seen the turnover of pastors many times.

We are not raising up enough of our own pastors in this synod. When was the last time your congregation sent someone to seminary?

I have always felt that once pastors lived here for

five or more years, they become committed to our rural life of small towns, beautiful summers and strong winters.

clergy, and eager to embrace a pastor.

In the October 2007 edition of "Northern Light-Notes and Quotes", Bishop Skrenes reflected on prayer:

Page 3 Northern Light

As I travel around this Synod, I find myself increasingly moved by the prayers during our Sunday worship services. In many places, the pastors and lay assistants carefully prepare and speak wonderful words in these genuine heartfelt petitions.

Thank you for praying for this Church and this Synod. Please pray that God will bless all the congregations in our Synod with a sense of mission and vision for what can be in the future. Pray that we will remain faithful to Christ. Pray that our works may prosper because they are God's works in this world.

Now let's look at some reflections from Bishop Finegan. In the October/November 2017 edition of "Northern Light-Notes and Quotes", she reflected on the ministry of the synod as she began her tenure as bishop:

- Calling "the Synod" for help is to avail yourself of all the resources that best practices, collective wisdom, past experience, and current policy has to offer.
- We attend to what is immediately within our reach...but still we keep an eye to the future and the big picture, having a clear enough idea of where we want to be headed together...
- We do not yet know what the finished garden will look like. We only know that what we're working on now will lead us to something else, and that will lead us to something else.

2020 brought on a global pandemic. On March 15, 2020, I recall visiting with Pastor Ingmar Levin at Zion, Manistique, who speculated with me as to whether this would be as serious as the Spanish Flu from the early 1900s. Pastor Levin remembered stories from that time. So, yes, even in all the newness of COVID, there were elements of history upon which to reflect.

Bishop Finegan offered perspective and comfort at the beginning of the pandemic. She wrote in the April/May 2020 issue of the "Northern Light":

It may be that by the time you read this, many congregations will have suspended having worship and cancelled all events where people gather. We have been forced into a fast... a Lenten fast... of Christian fellowship, community worship and prayers, and the joy of being together with Christ in our midst. (Isaiah 58:6—"Is not this the fast that I choose...to let the oppressed go free.")

Perhaps in the absence of what we have taken for granted...we will value more deeply the gift that God gives us in each other. There is blessing in the absence of God, for it is then that we seek God more fiercely. It is when darkness feels heavy that we pray with greater desperation.

Please hear again what the angels say throughout scripture, because they know us all too well...Do not be afraid.



I suspect that those of you who know Bishop Emeritus Skrenes and Bishop Finegan, can still see and hear them in your minds speaking these words. Are not these reflections still powerful and relevant today?

Even more important than recognizing that "we've been here before," is proclaiming in faith, "God has been here before!" Those who have gone before me, and people like Bishop Skrenes and Bishop Finegan, remind us to fervently pray for our own faithfulness in response to God's faithfulness. "To remember" God's faithfulness in the past is to be encouraged to trust God's faithfulness for the present moment and for the future. And, it's yet to seen what new thing our faithful God will be doing in our Northern Great Lakes Synod through people like you!

Let us pray: Lord God, we have this treasure in clay jars to prove that the power belongs to you. You have called your servants in the Northern Great Lakes Synod to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

EARTH'S CLIMATE CRISIS: An ELCA Social Message

At its April 2023 meeting the ELCA Church Council adopted a social message about climate care entitled: *Earth's Climate Crisis*.

Climate change appears to be impacting global weather patterns and the world's ice packs. What is our response? The introduction to the climate crisis social message states: "In the Holy Scriptures, God assigns a sacred responsibility to human beings: we are to care for and keep God's creation for future generations.... With this social message the ELCA provides facts, raises questions, draws on its own social teaching, and identifies convictions that address caretaking for Earth's climate."

As Christians, how are we called to care for creation? How are changes in the earth's atmosphere affecting our climate and life on earth? Are we facing a critical moment in time regarding the Earth's climate? What insights from ELCA social teachings are helpful? These questions and related topics are thoughtfully considered by the Earth's Climate Crisis social message.

Within the social message there are scriptural contexts, scientific data, questions and positions about climate change and our call to care for creation. There is a lot to unpack, and a short article cannot do this important topic the justice it deserves. Instead, if you are like me and want to explore this social message in depth, the NGLS is offering a Lifelong Faith Formation (LLFF) class this fall. The class will follow lessons found in an ELCA publication entitled *Our Kairos Moment: A Study Guide on Earth's Climate Crisis*. Watch for the fall LLFF class listings and join me as we explore scripture, view videos, read, discuss, and work on at-home activities to better understand what this social message means for us and our place in God's creation.

We have been informed once again that a number of our **Synod members have received phishing emails** from scammers **pretending to be Bishop Finegan.**

We take cyber security very seriously and ask that you also be vigilant in order to prevent fraud and to help protect everyone. Here are a few precautions to take:

- Confirm the sender's identity before replying to email requests and before opening attachments or clicking on links, even if they appear to come from a legitimate source.
- Know that the synod staff would never suddenly ask you to buy gift cards or make any kind of financial transaction over email.
- Call the Synod office to validate communications originating from the Synod.
- If it sounds off or fake, it likely is call or report the email to the Synod Office




