




"Synod" means "Walking Together"

All the congregations of the Northern Great Lakes Synod are intertwined in this mission work of Christ. We are grateful for the financial and people resources offered up for the sake of Christ's

mission. We are truly in this work together.



In planning for, facilitating, and nurturing the mission of this Church through congregations, the responsibilities of the synod include:

- Facilitating the call process
- Developing new ministries, redevelopment of existing ministries
- Leading and encouraging congregations in evangelism efforts
- Assisting congregations in carrying out their ministries in the world
- Encouraging congregations to respond to human need
- Encouraging financial support for the work of the local and global church by individuals and congregations
- Providing resources and trainings for lifelong faith growth



The ELCA's 65 synods vary greatly in size, geography, membership, staffing and program. Our smallest synod has 30 congregations – the largest nearly 300. Our Northern Great Lakes Synod has 79 congregations. The synods are grouped into nine regions, which are points of connection for them and the churchwide organization. Synods unite the work of congregations within their areas, serve as regional support, and guide pastoral and other staff candidates. In order to strengthen the relationship between synod leaders and the churchwide office, many churchwide teams relate to and support the work of the synods. We are a church that believes God is calling us into the world – together.

Martin Luther describes faith as a "living, busy, active, mighty thing". As Lutherans, we teach that faith is a gift. And yet, faith is dynamic and moving, less a package and more a relationship, less a possession, more a commitment of trust. We learn about faith and each other when we tell our stories, stories of faith and doubt, of God's presence felt or absence missed. In these last couple of pandemic years when we have had to work harder to stay connected, I think we understand more clearly the part that we play in building and nurturing our faith community. In other words, we play a part in our own faith life. As we consider Faith, Hope, and Love, I Hope these stories of Faith will nurture your Love for Jesus and the work we do for his sake.

<u>The Faithful Innovations Team from Faith Lutheran, Calumet</u> discerned that God was calling them to listen and pay attention to what draws people to events at the Calumet Colosseum Ice Arena and how God is present. Individuals and groups from the team "walked the neighborhoods" of Calumet to more intentionally see what's going on in their own community. Who knows what they might learn about their community through this "holy experiment?" God loves it when we listen and pay attention to God and others!

Mission of Hope in Delta County, Michigan

On August 8, 2021 hundreds of local families were served through Mission of Hope in Delta County. Mission of Hope in Delta County has been serving families in need since 2019, distributing kids' shoes, diapers, hygiene kits, groceries, backpacks filled with school supplies, as well as providing services like free haircuts and family pictures. Mission of hope was born out of a need in the area. Delta County has a poverty rate of over 30%.

Mission of hope is an ecumenical partnership of churches with different denominational backgrounds coming together to meet the needs of the community. In total, over 20 local churches and more than 400 volunteers have worked on the project over the past few years. Mission of Hope in Delta County adapted to the needs of those they seek to serve during the COVID-19 pandemic.



In 2019 the pre-pandemic event was hosted at the UP State Fair Grounds. In August of 2020 a

drive through version of Mission of Hope was executed. In 2021, the event was set to take place in Ludington Park until severe weather prompted a last-minute location change.

For months leading up to the event, the participating churches gather donations, supplies, and plan for the distribution. Last year alone Immanuel Lutheran Church gathered 800 packages of

diapers and wipes. Some were purchased through Thrivent Action Grants, while others were donated through a drive in the congregation.

Over the past few years, we have seen around 1,500 people served each year through Mission of Hope. Plans are underway for our event in August of 2022, as we seek to continue to partner with other local churches to serve the community of Delta County. Several churches from the Tri-County Conference of the Northern Great Lakes Synod have been involved in the events over the past few years.

Learning Together, We Are Church Together

We are church. We are Lutheran. We are church together. We are church for the sake of the world.

Shortly after her election, Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton introduced these four phrases to help describe who we are as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Lifelong Faith Formation in the Northern Great Lakes Synod has provided one way to be church together during the uncertainty and restrictions of the past two years, due to the pandemic.

The program was launched on Zoom in 2020 and has continued to grow community through a wide variety of classes which begin every September and January, at no cost to participants. Most recently, more than 120 people took part in the winter offerings, which were:

Anishinaabe Culture; Biblical Hebrew; Introduction to Islam; Ezekiel; The Big Picture Bible Discussion; and The Samuel Series: Prayer and the Spiritual Life. Past classes explored individual books of the Bible; our synod's partnership with the Lutheran Church in Tanzania; "Racism and Bias in Rural Communities;" Holy Communion; Biblical Greek; and discussion of books by Edwin Friedman and Dietrich Bonhoeffer.



So how does faith formation help us to be church together? It's one, active way to follow Jesus, who was highly regarded as a teacher during his ministry. Other than "Lord," people called Jesus "Teacher" more often than any other title, according to Marie Noel Keller in the *Journal of Research on Christian Education*. Think of all the ways and places that Jesus taught: in the temple, on the hillside, from a boat, in people's homes, among other locations. Jesus established a model of teaching people wherever he is and wherever they

are, as Keller noted. Now, here we are, learning through Zoom.

At the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, Lifelong Faith Formation helped many of us to feel less isolated. We enjoyed the company of others, sharing time, learning, conversation and prayer with each other. As we grow in knowledge of Scripture, Christian traditions, and contemporary issues, we find we also grow in faith.

Lifelong Faith Formation in our synod has been blessed with outstanding teachers, primarily pastors. Surveys about our leaders have been highly complimentary, highlighting their enthusiasm, knowledge, investment in the class, student engagement, and use of humor. With the help of a \$22,700 ELCA Synod Vitality Grant, we continue to offer training modules/ seminars for congregational presidents and lay leaders. Some of these resources are archived on the synod's YouTube channel. We continue to host "Faithful Innovations" cohort trainings. This grant money also allows us to feature various stewardship training events such as the one we had with Grace Pomroy of Luther Seminary. Sunday School Moves Outside!

When COVID-19 restricted indoor gatherings at Bethel Lutheran Church in Menominee, MI, its Sunday School program took a hiatus. Sunday School teacher, Stefanie Ehle, surveyed parents and discovered that families weren't interested in adding more screen time to their week with virtual Sunday School. Not to be discouraged, she just planned everything outside instead!

Kids of all ages now gather at a local park on Sundays for a Bible story, songs, games, snacks, and lots of play time in God's creation. Each gathering is different and depending on



the weather, activities include hiking trails, exploring forts, sledding, and playing on the playground equipment. A highlight for everyone in 2021 was gathering at a local donkey farm to read the Christmas story together and experience some of the sights and smells that were present at Jesus' birth. The kids learned about Jerusalem donkeys and got to feed them, too!

The outdoor gatherings have been well received by both kids and parents, and plans for next year will definitely include more outdoor activities, even as pandemic restrictions continue to lift and we transition back inside.

With a Current Balance of some \$416,000,

the Undesignated "Equipping the Saints Endowment Fund"

allows for 5% minimum distribution for ministries that are not necessarily part of our synod budget. These funding distributions are crucial as the regular budget of the synod has been reduced in past years.

We thank God for those who had the wisdom to create this synod endowment fund. And, we welcome gifts of all kinds—direct monetary gifts or deferred legacy gifts in the form of trusts, property, insurance, etc. These distributions allow creative and ongoing ministries to happen!

Proposed 2022 distributions totaling \$20,614 are:

<u>Pastor's Debt Relief</u> – In an effort to lighten the load, increase the pastor's financial acumen, and free the pastor to serve well, we offer an annual grant and financial counseling resources.

<u>Bay College Campus Ministry in Escanaba</u>—A part-time campus pastor serves at Bay and this modest funding helps make a Christian presence on campus possible.

Synod Youth Events - Plans are in the works for youth events throughout the year.

<u>Lifelong Faith Formation Classes</u>—In recent years more than 400 people have participated in adult education via Zoom. Funds support teachers, the administrator, and curriculum help.

<u>Website Development and Maintenance</u>—The synod recently switched to a different website manager to update the site and make it more efficient and user friendly.

<u>WLUC TV6 Christmas Worship</u>—The pandemic created need and opportunity for a quality TV broadcast at Christmas. We plan to continue offering this worship service into the future.

<u>Wisconsin Council of Churches</u>—We partner with other Wisconsin synods to support a consultant who provides support and education around community organizing and justice.

U.P. Wild – Our collaborative and innovative ministry focusing on outdoor worship.

<u>Leadership Support</u> – A Bishop's Convocation provides local continuing education.

An additional \$97,554* was distributed out of designated restricted endowment funds for:

- Seminarian Scholarships
- Tanzanian Scholarships and Companion Relationship
 - Rural Ministry
 - Pastor's Debt Relief

These are areas that people have a passion about in their designation of these funds.

*Note: These distributions are not part of our regular synod budget.



Where did the Synod spend the monies we received?

The approximate numbers below represent distributions from both unrestricted income (money the synod has some discretion of where to spend it) and restricted income (money the synod received with a specific designation)

\$464,000 of Congregational Mission Support sent to the Northern Great Lakes Synod and designated gifts was passed on to the

ELCA Churchwide organization.

The ELCA uses that money to provide

domestic and global ministries in Christ's name. Some of that money is funneled back to our synod through grants for synod personnel and campus ministry. The ELCA proclaims Christ through hunger relief, missionary efforts, disaster relief, training leaders, providing educational resources, and advocacy just to name some of the ELCA's many impacts. Having a national church pool its efforts makes our witness stronger than any single congregation or synod.



\$160,000 was shared with partners in ministry such as seminaries, ELCA church related colleges, campus ministries, Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp, and the Wisconsin Council of Churches. Seminaries train leaders for the church. Campus Ministries in our own synod are active at Michigan Tech in Houghton, Finlandia in Hancock, Bay College in Escanaba, and Northern Michigan in Marquette. Colleges are often critical times for people of all ages to grow in their faith in Christ and create a community that shares the love of Jesus with others.

The Wisconsin Council of Churches was most helpful in providing great resources to pastors and congregations during the pandemic.

\$80,000 was used within our synod for specific congregational ministries, outreach and hunger ministries. Congregational programming was supported, people heard the Good News of Jesus and people were fed.


\$395,000 was used for Office Operations, Personnel and Administration.

The synod office has 4 full-time staff: Bishop Katherine Finegan; Assistant to the Bishop and Director for Evangelical Mission Jim Duehring; Office Administrator Heather Oysti; and Bookkeeper/Secretary Betsy Koski. Deacon Lori Ward is a part-time Synod Missioner working with our Licensed Lay Ministers and Lifelong Faith Formation. Stefanie Ehle is part-time Synod Youth Ministries Coordinator. We assist congregations and leaders in their ministries both administratively and pastorally. We are just a phone call or email away. We are here to serve you and serve the Lord's work in this synod and beyond.








U.P. Wild Church is a means of encountering the actively Living God, based on shared values of faith, connection, and nature. Deep within the Christian tradition there hides a wealth of wisdom on how to cultivate a culture of compassion.

U.P. Wild Church is for everyone. You are welcome whether you are a part of a Christian faith community already, questioning your faith, in recovery from wounds inflicted by religious trauma, simultaneously receiving nourishment from other faith traditions, or simply seeking to go deeper.

We offer monthly Nature Prayer Services in a public car, monthly wilderness walks at a revolving location, mobile prayer stations, online wilderness walks and events, and are in development of family programming from those within our community. From regularly scheduled prayer gatherings, to moonlight snowshoe hikes or silent strolls across deer trails to special Kids Gatherings, the programs for children are hugely popular for parents as well. Parents both assist with the planning and carrying out of the service, but they often find these a source of parental support as well. Most every gathering has some on-line coverage, again reaching an even larger audience.




