I have really enjoyed this devotional and will use a week of the devotionals as a guide for my thoughts in preparing my comments.

Sunday, June 19, 2022

Text: Luke 4:8 (NIV)

Jesus answered, "It is written: Worship the Lord your God and serve him only."

Without a doubt, the scripture for this Sunday is very appropriate for the day. Sunday is certainly the big day for worship within our congregations. I know that I treasure the worship service each Sunday and also enjoy participating and helping with the services. I know that it is true in our congregation, and it is probably true for many of the congregations within the synod, that the attendance at services is at an all-time low. I find myself looking around during the service to see who is attending and frequently become concerned about the low numbers. But I have to remind myself to refocus my thoughts and concerns to the true purpose of worship which is to worship my Lord and my God. I need my mind to be focused and captured on the right things and then I will receive the direction and strength to live out my obligations within his Kingdom.

Prayer: Open my heart and my mind to the Holy Spirit so that I can be directed to serve and worship my Lord and God. Amen

Monday, June 20, 2022

Text: Luke 9:49-50 (NKJV)

Now John answered and said, "Master, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we forbade him because he does not follow with us." But Jesus said to him, "Do not forbid him, for he who is not against us is on our side."

Wouldn't it be nice if everyone believed like me, worshiped like me, voted like me, supported my synod like me and the list could go on? No – it wouldn't be nice: in fact, it would be boring and result in me missing out on hearing and learning actions and messages that can be more

powerful than anything I could devise or consider. Jesus repeatedly taught us to be open to others – just think of the parable of the Good Samaritan for one example. The journey for each of us can be very different and it is a never-ending process of learning from others. We humans are so quick to notice the differences of others and not tune in to the many similarities – we really do have so much more in common so let's build on that. Tuesday, June 21, 2022

Text: John 3:16 (NIV)

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

Certainly, this passage from scripture is very familiar. It falls into the category such as the Lord's Prayer or the 23rd Psalm. Passages that are so familiar to us that, sometimes, I fear that saying them becomes rote and we say the words but forget the deep meaning.

One word stands out in power in this passage and, of course, that word is LOVE. Love is the supreme gift we receive from our Redeemer. We receive his love in so many ways in our daily lives – love of spouse, love of children, love of fellow Christian friends, or love from our neighbors. Wednesday, June 22, 2022

Text: 1 Thessalonians 5:18 (ESV)

Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

How powerful, would you say, is the power of a sincere thank you? It makes no difference if you give it or if you receive it. I would say that a sincere thank you is probably one of the most powerful forces in our lives. Just think about it – how long could you go without receiving any kind of thanks or recognition for what you have done? I am sure that you would quickly become discouraged and probably give up what you are doing. Unfortunately, I am afraid that we frequently forget to give a sincere thank you, but we do not so easily forget to give out a

criticism, or a put down, on someone. It seems that we are more likely to criticize than we are to thank. Jesus shows us another way. Jesus demonstrated his love and his thanks throughout his ministry, and we are challenged to continue to follow the lead of Jesus in extending thanks. So, today, I challenge you to surprise someone with a sincere thank you for what they do that make this world a better place.

Prayer: Dear God, help me to remember all of the things that I have for which I should be thankful and to remember to thank you for my many gifts. Also, give me many opportunities to extend thanks to those around me – it just may make their day brighter. Amen

Thursday, June 23, 2022

Text: Ephesians 4:16 (Good News Bible)

Under His control, all the different parts of the body fit together, and the whole body is held together by every joint with which it is provided.

Our body is indeed a wonderful design of many parts that work together in harmony. And we know that it is a gift from God and should be treated like a temple with care and love.

Unfortunately, we frequently neglect our bodies and then we often bear the consequences of illness, discomfort, and loss of movement. In the same manner, our church is a design of many parts that needs to work in union in order for it to function at the highest outcome. We are presently facing extreme challenges to our church and just like our body it can be resistant to change. Text: Psalm 125:1 (ESV)

Those who trust in the Lord are like Mt. Zion, which cannot be moved, but abides forever.

Text: Ephesians 4:15 (Good News Bible)
